In 2000, his donations supported the establishment of G. T. (Ellen Yeung) College in Hong Kong, named after his wife, to nurture local talent.

Mr Yeung believes that collaboration among industry, academia and the research sector will result in a win-win scenario. With the support of industry, universities can stay at the forefront in both teaching and research. Industry can prosper with the help of the cutting-edge technology developed, and the engineering talent nurtured, at universities. Over the years, Mr Yeung has built up a strong relationship with CityU. Apart from facilitating cooperation between industry and CityU, his company has made use of many of CityU's research developments and has employed many of our engineering graduates, two of whom are now the most senior engineers in his company. In 2005, Mr Yeung helped coordinate donations from Fujikon, AV Concept Holdings Ltd, and Mobicon Group Ltd for CityU's development. One of CityU's lecture theatres was named the FAM Lecture Theatre in recognition of their valued contributions.

A highly respected industrialist, Mr Yeung said the key to success for young people is to get as well-equipped as possible, as opportunity favours those who are well-prepared. He reminds the young generation to be less calculating, but more proactive and dedicated. They should strive to broaden their horizons and minds, and be observant and innovative, he added. Boasting a strong emotional attachment to Hong Kong, Mr Yeung has full confidence in the future of our city. While there have been plenty of challenges in recent years, he believes that Hong Kong will soon be back on the right track, ready to scale new heights. He encourages young people to make the best use of the opportunities brought about by the development of the Greater Bay Area.
