NON-ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

- ii. An Applicant Statement of maximal 800 words describing their interests in animals and the veterinary profession, and reflecting their relevant (volunteer) work experience. personal achievements, and aspirations for studying veterinary medicine.

Shortlisted applicants will be invited for an interview conducted in English.
