#### Part II Course Details

#### 1. Abstract

This course aims to guide students in the planning, implementation and write-up of a substantial independent research project, exploring one of the themes from their studies of International or Development issues (chosen by the student in consultation with the supervisor). Before undertaking this course—in lieu of the required "Capstone Project" (PIA6018/PIA6018A or PIA6019/PIA6019A)—students must have first completed PIA5026 Research Design for the Social Sciences with a minimum grade of A. The Master's thesis is an opportunity for students to draw on new knowledge gained from MA coursework, previous knowledge derived from undergraduate studies and design a project that entails original discovery and innovation.

## 1. Keyword Syllabus

After initial discussion of the student's preferred topic with the supervisor (typically based on the final proposal prepared for PIA5026), the student will be required to prepare a substantial proposal as a basis for further discussion. The self-directed course will then focus on the ethical review application, the relevant analytical frameworks, and (once the ethical committee approves the research project) on gathering of relevant data or comparable case studies, analysis of the variables or context, implications, and eventually effective presentation and writing. Students and supervisors will meet frequently to discuss progress, issues, and problems.
