#### Course Aims

This is a research seminar type course. It aims to develop students' research ability through case study, particularly in the following respects: (i) acquisition of in-depth knowledge of current issues in semantics, (ii) critical review of relevant literature, (iii) independent formulation of hypotheses/theories, and (iv) academic argumentation.

#### **Keyword Syllabus**

Topics will vary according to the interests and specialization of the instructor. The domain of study will be based on a relevant, coherent body of published literature which has played or is currently playing a role in the development of theories in semantics. The seminar will typically consist of an introduction to and critical review of the literature, comparison and evaluation of alternative hypotheses and theories, and data analysis. Students are expected to participate actively in terms of presentations and the writing of research papers.
