<p><b>Journal Article / Movie Report</b></p> <p>Each student submits one journal article/movie report of no less than 1,500 words. They could choose any one journal article or book chapter recommended by the lecturer. Students can also ask the lecturer for approval should they want to conduct the review on an article or book chapter not given by the lecturer.</p>	√	√	√			20%	
<p><b>Group Project and Term Paper</b></p> <p>Each group submits a paper of no less than 2,000 words. The topic should be related to the topic of “What is social change?” and “What are its impacts on individuals and society?” In preparing for the presentation and write-up, each group chooses one empirical case of social change as the subject of analysis. Then, one social science perspective is chosen to explain various phenomena related to the case of social change in question. Afterwards, the group should compare and contrast the findings identified with other social science perspectives. Finally, each group should conduct a critical analysis of “What is social change?” and “What are its impacts on individuals and society?”</p>			√	√		45%
