1. Keyword Syllabus

<u>Signal propagation and mobile channels:</u> Fast fading and slow fading; flat fading and frequency-selective fading; vehicle motion and Doppler frequency shift; coherence bandwidth and coherence time.

<u>Cellular systems:</u> Frequency reuse; reuse pattern; system capacity; channel assignment; signal to co-channel interference ratio; power control and handoff..

Modulation and coding techniques: Brief description of GSM; convolutional codes and turbo codes; generation polynomials; shift registers encoder; trellis diagram and Viterbi decoder; free distance and correction capability; Soft-in soft-output decoder.

<u>CDMA systems:</u> Brief description of IS-95; spreading codes; PN sequences; processing gains; interleaving.

<u>OFDM systems</u>: Brief description of LTE; DFT and FFT; adaptive loading; cyclic pre-fix; peak-to-average-power ratio; time-frequency resource.

<u>Multiple antenna techniques:</u> Beam patterns to nullify co-channel interferers; maximal ratio combining; equal gain combining; selection combining; diversity gain; space-division multiple access (SDMA).
