#### 1. Abstract

The aims of this course are to provide students with an introduction to those principles, rules, and regulations - as developed by common law and from legislation that affect animals with a further view to encourage and motive students in the developments of this area. The course will provide a summary of historical origins and examine the current laws in their philosophical and practical aspects underpinning a variety of differing perspectives with a focus on comparing the laws relating to animals across different jurisdictions. The course will further implement on the practical aspects of the laws relating to animals and welfare

by providing a motived and innovative environment for a possibility of putting in practice interactions and experience in animal related work.

#### 1. Keyword Syllabus

Animals, Animal Law, Animal Responsibility, Animal Welfare, Property, theoretical, ethical, and socio-political perspectives on human-animal dynamics, Policy, anti-cruelty laws.

## **Detailed Syllabus**

The students are provided with an overview of the course and resources in support of the study of the subject and encouraged to discover the comparative aspect between the laws in Hong Kong and other jurisdictions.

Therefore, the course will deal with the following:

- 1. A summary of historical origins of the legal concept applicable to animals, animal welfare etc.
- 2. The principles, rules, and regulations as developed by common law and from statute that affect animals.
- 3. It will examine such laws in their philosophical, scientific, and practical underpinnings, and from a variety of differing perspectives, exploring how the law has treated animals in the past and may treat them in the future both locally and internationally.
- 4. It will discuss the foundational of defining animals to the pragmatic aspects of cases involving animals and discuss the substantive constraints that might occur in prosecuting an animal cruelty case in Hong Kong and will address diverse questions and answers in such areas as contract, tort and criminal in a comparative manner.
- 5. It will allow students to appreciate the current status of the social, economical, political and legal status of animals and allow them to use a pragmatic approach to deal with the issues that had or may arise.
