1. Keyword Syllabus

There is no set syllabus for an independent study project. Instead, the subject is organized through principles of guided mentoring, one-on-one discussion and instruction, and collaboration between the student and the faculty adviser.

Normally, an independent study project is initiated by the student, who develops an idea for a research topic or project, and then approaches a member of the SCM teaching staff to request that they serve as adviser.

The student and faculty member agree on the terms of the project (i.e., specific topic or theme, work schedule and process, meeting schedule, expected end result), and then consult regularly concerning the project over the course of the semester.

The project's end result is determined by the nature of the investigation. It may consist of a written essay, a script or other creative writing project, or a creative project involving the use of one or more of the media technologies available to SCM students.

The project is expected to be conceived and executed in its entirety over the course of the semester. However, proposals for projects requiring a longer period of time to complete may be considered.
