This assessment will grade on content and fluency of presentation as well as the well organised and coherent of the assignment. The group delivering presentation must have thoroughly studied and researched their topic and worked as a team on the collection, reading, selection, integration, analysis of the resources. They require showing their abilities to lead the classmates into participating in the discussion, to explain with Rich content, excellent grasp of the materials with indepth or extensive knowledge of the subject matter; rigorous organization, coherent structure, balanced composition and to criticize and analysis with convincing statement and creative comment.
