### Part II

#### **Course Aims**

This course aims at introducing students to the 'wet' side of shipping law, i.e. aspects of shipping law focusing on marine casualties and legal consequences flowing from these and promoting attitude of critical and reflective learning. This is different from the 'dry' side which focuses more on maritime contractual relationship, a subject matter of which is covered in LW4636 Sea Carriage Law. The course consists of two parts: substantive part and procedural part. The substantive part deals with the carriage of passenger, the law of salvage, the law of towage, the law relating to marine pollution, and the law on limitation of liability. The procedural part deals mainly with the admiralty jurisdiction and practices, including maritime liens and arrest of ships.

### **Keyword Syllabus**

Carriage of Passenger, Salvage, Towage, Wrecks, Marine Pollution, Limitation of Liabilities, Actions in *rem*, Actions in *personam*, Admiralty Jurisdiction, international conventions relating to Carriage of Passengers, Salvage, Wrecks, Maritime Pollution, and Limitation of Liabilities.

## **Detailed Syllabus**

The students are provided with an overview of the course and resources in support of the study of the subject. It is to be understood from the outset that this course will not cover legal issues relating to ship collisions. The reason is because most collision cases involve complex issues of navigation which are outside the scope of this course. Therefore, the course will deal with following issues:

- 1. Carriage of Passengers, General characteristics of salvage and towage contracts
- 2. Liability of salvors and the Salvage Convention 1989
- 3. Salvage and the protection of marine environment
- 4. Salvage and shipwrecks
- 5. Marine Pollution
- 6. Carriage of hazardous and noxious substances by sea
- 7. Limitation of Liability
- 8. Admiralty Jurisdiction action in rem and action in personam
- 9. Classification of claims in rem
- 10. Arrest of ships in Hong Kong and Judicial sale
- 11. Problems concerning arrest of ships
